About FEVERS and other SYMPTOMS:

A child with a temperature above 100 orally will be sent home from school. - A fever is defined as an oral temperature above 100 degrees orally or an axillary (armpit) temperature of 99 degrees.
- could be normal in the morning, but the fever may be present in the afternoon. in the afternoon, and is highest in the evening. When the child begins to recover, the temperature In most mild illnesses (2-5 days duration), the fever is lowest in the morning hours, begins to increase

How to Keep Yourself Healthy

- 1. Hand washing- Use soap and water and wash for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.
- Cover your mouth and nose with tissues when coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid sharing drinks, water bottles,
- 4. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.
- Germs spread this way.

 5. Rest and drink plenty of fluids.
